With 90% of the BCS Federal Fisheries inspectors gone for all of 2020 <u>ROC's expanded vigilance</u> is more important than ever.

SeaWatch has spent the last 27 years promoting reef and reef fish recovery in the Sea of Cortez. In the last 10 years, **ROC** (Red de Observadores Ciudadanos), a citizen driven vigilance program and **Espiritu Santo es Parte de Ti**, a communication campaign prompting pride and good practices in the Espiritu Santo National Park, have become our two signature programs. In 2019, that work culminated in Espiritu Santo National Park being named one of the best managed and protected parks in the world by the <u>ICUN</u>.

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In 2019 commitments were made to dramatically increase vigilance patrols protecting an addition 58 miles of coastline between Cabo Pulmo and Espititu Santo National Park. The results of that work as well as the continuing campaign to stop the public consumption of reef critical fish like parrotfish are shown below.

New Billboard Campaign, which made national news, reaches a new demographic as 1500 cars pass our signs

Coronavirus made us try new ways of communicating, keeping a safe distance. We launched our first two billboards to reduce consumption of parrotfish. We used Zoom to reach 300 students, and to have meetings and a forum with scientists, NGOs and environmental lawyers with whom we partner to make parrotfish protected by law.

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December 9th - It's still happening continually around La Paz. With only 2 Federal Fisheries Inspectors left out

of 16 a year ago - ROC working with those remaining inspectors is more critical than ever.
